Write a poem on the theme of 'What I wonder'. e.g. I wonder why the sky is blue and why it is not green, if it was a different colour, it would be the strangest thing I've seen. Use the internet to research how the Vikings invaded England and the reasons why they invaded.	Go on a family walk in an area which has trees. Collect as many different leaves as you can. Can you name any of the trees they are from?
Read your book for at least twenty minutes. Tell someone about what has happened.	Times table practice (you could use TT Rockstars if you like). Concentrate on the 7, 8 and 9x tables.	Create a cartoon strip to show how the Vikings gained control of north-east England.	Make a collage of the leaves you collected from your walk.
Write a diary entry of your day today. Try and use at least 6 different time connectives within your writing.	Compete five examples of long division. Remember to show all of your working out clearly.	Draw pictures of 4 people that you know. Label them with an introduction in French using 'Il s'appelle' or 'Elle s'appelle' e.g. Il s'appelle Monsieur Glenton	Bake a cake (or use another recipe if you do not have any flour!) and enjoy your cookery with your family.
Split a piece of paper into five sections. Write either adjective, adverb, noun, preposition or verb in each area. Write five words that belong in each section.	Complete five examples of long multiplication. Remember to show all of your working out clearly.	Make an art sculpture of something from the Viking times. You could either do some junk modelling, clay modelling or use fabric.	Help your parent cook a dinner for the whole family. It must involve cutting, mixing and plating up.
Research the author of the book you are reading at the moment. Write a biography of that author, including key facts and information about that person.
