



Sports Premium Funding 2019 – 2020



Sports Premium funding is an amount of money which the government has agreed to allocate schools over an academic year. The funding amount schools receive is based upon the number of children from Year 1 upwards as well as a base amount of £16,000 (doubled from the previous year). **Our allocated funding for 2019 – 2020 is £17,340.**

There are now five main aims that this premium should be used to address:

1. The engagement of **all** pupils in regular, physical activity.
2. The profile of PE and sports being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff teaching PE and sport.
4. Broader experiences of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increasing participation in competitive sport.

Below is an overview of how this funding has been (and is planned to be) spent.
