Design a leaflet explaining how to stay safe during the lockdown. Use bullet points and pictures. You could do this on the computer if you have one or you can draw this yourself. Squats, jogging on the spot, lunges, star jumps, burpees, press ups, sit ups, planks e.g. 30 seconds squat, 30 seconds rest, 30 seconds jog, etc.	Practise throwing with someone. See if you can throw and catch without dropping to ten. Move further away from each other and try again. Once you can do this easily, see how many times you can throw without dropping. Did you get to 50?			
Alphabet poem.  Use this pattern to make up an alphabet poem. Each line must have two adjectives, a noun, a verb and an adverb. You might need to use a dictionary, thesaurus or computer to help you find the words. Don't forget to carry over the ten if the ones are more than ten.  34 + 45	Create a bug hotel using items that you collect on your daily walk. Build it in a quiet place, dark in your garden and wait for your guests to arrive. You could use pebbles, twigs, pine cones, leaves, soil etc.  Create a creature from recycled materials. Think about where it will live, what it will eat and how it will travel.  Describe it to someone else.	Do a jigsaw puzzle together if you have one. If not get creative and have a go at making one! Draw and colour your own image or cut one from a magazine then cut it into pieces for a family member to try to piece back together.  On your daily walk, try to identify as many different trees or flowers as you can. Download a guide onto your parent's phone or print one out. Learn them by heart so you can spot them next time.			
Choose a book to read or one that you have already read. Did you like the book? Why? Who was your favourite character? Where did the story take place? What was the best part of the book - describe it. Who would you recommend the book to and why? Give your book stars out of 5 and draw a scene from the book.
