





Home Learning Grid

This grid will give you some ideas of activities you can do at home. Try and complete one activity from each section (column) every day (Mon-Fri).

English	Maths	Wider Curriculum	Family Fun
Design a leaflet explaining how to stay safe during the lockdown. Use bullet points and pictures. You could do this on the computer if you have one or you can draw this yourself.	How fast can you solve these simple maths facts under 20? Time yourself. Can you spot any patterns? What are they? You will need a timer. 30 seconds working and then 30 seconds resting. Squats, jogging on the spot, lunges, star jumps, burpees, press ups, sit ups, planks e.g. 30 seconds squat, 30 seconds rest, 30 seconds jog, etc.	Practise throwing with someone. See if you can throw and catch without dropping to ten. Move further away from each other and try again. Once you can do this easily, see how many times you can throw without dropping. Did you get to 50?
Alphabet poem. Use this pattern to make up an alphabet poem. Each line must have two adjectives, a noun, a verb and an adverb. You might need to use a dictionary, thesaurus or computer to help you find the words. There are 26 letters so you can take 2 days to do this. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> African, adventurous alligator ate angrily bad, boisterous bear bakes beautifully clever, cunning crocodile cooks cautiously 	Adding - Use our method of drawing tens and ones (chips and peas) to work out these calculations. Don't forget to carry over the ten if the ones are more than ten. 34 + 45 56 + 12 63 + 27 81 + 9 27 + 37 56 + 38 18 + 45 44 + 17 36 + 56 77 + 23 Subtracting - Use our method of drawing the first number and then crossing out to take away. Build it in a quiet place, dark in your garden and wait for your guests to arrive. You could use pebbles, twigs, pine cones, leaves, soil etc.	Do a jigsaw puzzle together if you have one. If not get creative and have a go at making one! Draw and colour your own image or cut one from a magazine then cut it into pieces for a family member to try to piece back together.
Choose a book to read or one that you have already read. Did you like the book? Why? Who was your favourite character? Where did the story take place? What was the best part of the book - describe it. Who would you recommend the book to and why? Give your book stars out of 5 and draw a scene from the book.	Harriet had collected 64 pebbles but gave 27 to her brothers so they could all make a picture. How many does Harriet have left? Is this an add or a subtract problem? Write 5 of your own subtraction problems (with the answers) like this.	Use plastic bags and string to make parachutes for your teddies. Ask your parents to drop these from somewhere high for you. Which parachute takes the longest to reach the ground? Can you alter the parachute to make it work better?	At bedtime, make up a bedtime story. Choose a character (they could be made up or real) and decide where they go, what happens to them, which other characters you might bring in. You could continue your story for several nights or ask an adult to make up a chapter.

How many words can you make using these prefixes and suffixes? E.g. unhappy playful misunderstand dismiss

Stanley had 45 comics and George had 26. How many did they have altogether? This is an addition problem. Write 5 of your own (with the answers) like this.

Get sketching - using just a pencil and piece of paper. Practise your drawing and observational skills by sketching things around the house, in the garden or the view from your window. Can you improve your sketches? Ask an adult to help you draw 3D.

Play Pictionary! (2+ players) Split into two teams. Take it in turns to draw something and let the others see if they can guess correctly! Use a timer - you only have 1 minute. Keep score and see who wins.
