Make ice-lollies - Now the weather is getting hotter, experiment with making some ice-lollies. You could experiment with different flavoured juices or even use real fruit. Yum! If you don't have a mould, just use a plastic cup with a spoon.

Dig a flowerbed - Now the garden centres have opened up, maybe you could get some bedding or vegetable plants. Prepare a flowerbed by digging the soil over and weed before planting. Water well and watch them grow©
