Either get a copy of the book or watch the film. What did you think of it? How different are the children's lives to yours?</p>	<p>Collect natural materials which you could make a wind chime for. You will need some string to tie everything together.</p>
<p>Watch newsround every day this week. Write a summary for one of the stories covered each day.</p>	<p>How many ways can you make 150 by using at least two operations? E.g. <math>35 \times 3 + 45</math>. Can you make them a bit more tricky to solve?</p>	<p>It is family history day this month. Draw a family tree, starting with you at the bottom and working your way backwards. How far can you go? Ask your grandparents for more information.</p>	<p>Go for a walk with your family to somewhere you have not been before. Collect things on the way to help with your wind chime.</p>
<p>The summer reading challenge is being started by all the libraries all over the country. Make your own poster to advertise it and put it up in your window.</p>	<p>Play a game of battleships (you can find this online too if you haven't got the game. This will help you to practice your coordinates.</p>	<p>Use a camera or phone to take some pictures of outside. Use these to make a collage of images of your local area.</p>	<p>Have a go at making a savoury dish that you can share with your family. This could either be a snack or even a dinner meal.</p>
