# Funding

Sports Premium funding is an amount of money which the government has agreed to allocate schools over an academic year. The funding amount schools receive is based upon the number of children from Year 1 upwards as well as a base amount of £16,000.

## Our allocated funding for 2022 - 2023 follow -

   The profile of PE and sports being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff teaching PE and sport.
- 4. Broader experiences of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increasing participation in competitive sport.
